- -A trip to the Shakespeare Theatre to see


Romeo and Juliet

AWARDS SPOTLIGHT ACADEMY ACHIEVEMENTS

A major Baltimore educational institution and a national education organization have individually presented top annual awards to Mother Seton Academy.

Loyola College presented its *Milch Award for Excellence in Accomplishment* for the Academy's commitment to "helping Baltimore's most under served youth break the cycle of poverty through academic preparedness and for its devotion to upholding the highest ideals of Catholic education." Principal Sr. Mary Bader accepted the award on the school's behalf at the college's graduation ceremony in May.

The National Catholic Education Association (NCEA) chose Sister Mary Bader for its *Distinguished Principal Award*. Sister Mary was one of twelve principals in the country to receive the award. She received the award at a special banquet during the NCEA conference which was held in Atlantic City in April.

"Everyone who has contributed to Mother Seton Academy deserves to stand in the spotlight— from founders and families to teachers, staff, volunteers and benefactors," said Sister Mary. "With humility, we are grateful for the recognition. With conviction, we reflect daily on our continuing responsibilities to care for, support, and educate Baltimore's children."

ACADEMY BEGINS NEW GRADUATE SUPPORT PROGRAM

With the help of grants from the **Cassin Educational Initiative Foundation** and the Baltimore Direct Services Grants Program of the **Annie E. Casey Foundation**, Mother Seton Academy has launched a new *Graduate Support Program*. The program will provide the additional support and services to Academy eighth graders and graduates as they advance into high school, college, and the work force.

Nicole Yeftich, a long-time Mother Seton Academy staff member, has accepted the new position as Graduate Support Coordinator at the school. "We are thrilled to have Ms. Yeftich to coordinate this new program at our school," said Sr. Mary Bader. "She has been an asset to Mother Seton Academy since she first stepped through our doors six years ago as a Notre Dame AmeriCorps member. She knows and loves all of our graduates and is the perfect person to provide them with the additional support that they need when they graduate from our school."

As Graduate Support Coordinator, Ms. Yeftich has begun to establish resources for students, graduates, and their families to help them succeed in high school and college as well as in the working world. This year, she will work with eighth grade students and their families to assist them with the high school application process, including the coordination of student visits to high schools and the completion of application forms. She is also in the process of developing a comprehensive program for Academy graduates, including monthly support meetings, tutoring as needed, help in identifying employment opportunities, and assistance with the college application process including general information, application and financial aid assistance, and SAT preparation.

Ms. Yeftich hopes to be able to provide the additional support, information, and assistance that will allow Academy eighth graders to make smooth transitions to high school and to enable graduates to remain connected to the school as well as to find the help, advice, and guidance that they need in order to enjoy life and to find success in whatever pathway they choose to embark.

Please keep the family of Erica Vidal '96 in your prayers. Erica passed away in March. May she rest in peace.






REVENUE
