MOTHER SETON ACADEMY EXPANDS AFTER-SCHOOL ENRICHMENT

other Seton Academy was the recipient of a generous grant from The Marion I. and Henry J. Knott Foundation to help build our after-school program. We were excited to introduce six new programs for our students to choose from and enjoy throughout the year:

Cooking and Nutrition: Diana Sugiuich, RD/LDN, CNSD, ACS, HFS (website: www.nourishfamily.com) taught our students ways to cook and eat healthy foods, without giving up taste and enjoyment. Some of the recipes they tried were panko-crusted salmon with cranberries and dim-sum turkey meatballs, all easy to make, affordable and good for you!



<u>Clayworks</u>: Brought to Mother Seton Academy by Baltimore Clayworks, and taught by Sarah McCann, the children learned how to hand build wonderful clay projects through pinch pot and coil forms, as well as slab construction. This allowed the

students to discover new ways of expressing their feelings and creativity through clay.

Dance: Taught by Traci Jiggetts, Baltimore Dancer, Choreographer and Musical Theatre Director, Mother Seton Academy students learned dance and performance skills, many for the first time. The students



benefitted from the creativity, exercise and confidence acquired through dance. The program kicked-off with a wonderful public performance at the Murphy Fine Arts Hall at Morgan State University.

Swimming at Loyola University: The swim program was taught at Loyola University Maryland under the coordination of Rachael Finley, Asst. Director of Recreational Sports, Facilities and Special Events. Many students in this program experienced swimming for the first time, and learned to overcome their fear of water while having a fun time.

Mentoring: The Mentoring program, sponsored by the Center for Community Service and Justice at Loyola University and facilitated by student-leader Jenn Ruckel, brings Loyola University students to MSA to participate in non-academic

George's County, Maryland high school, and was expanded this year to a full school-year program providing resources and support for oratory integration to participating middle and high school classrooms across the nation. The program uses the words and speeches of great American orators like Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass to strengthen students' speaking, writing and leadership skills. The 2011-2012 class of Oratory Fellows included only 6 teachers across the country, including our own Jim Rossi, 8th grade teacher at Mother Seton Academy.

Spoken Word/Poetry: The Spoken Word is a program designed to encourage students to express themselves through the spoken word and poetry. This program was led by David Ross and Femi Lawai from The 5th L, a nationally recognized spoken word group, who have a passion for artistic expression and, with their words, intend to inspire the planet in a positive way. Students in the Spoken Word program learned to translate their pain and positives into poetry, such as the poem highlighted below: "My Dreams" by Shetia Ogle. The year ended with a performance by the students at a student assembly, and publication of a book of their poetry.


We were thrilled with the success of these programs and with the skills the students gained from these special activities. The excitement and enthusiasm on the days the students participated in these after-school programs proved what studies have shown – that the students have more energy, become more engaged in their studies and more connected to their peers in a positive way if they are occupied in a stimulating activity. We look forward to continuing these enriching after-school programs in the coming years.

Ford's Theatre - Continued

Throughout the school year, Rossi worked one-onone with teaching artists from the Ford's Theatre Society Education Department to integrate oratory and performance into English and History classrooms. Rossi participated in group discussions through the use of video conferencing in the classroom, connecting with teaching artists in Washington and with students from participating schools across the country.

In early May, each Oratory Fellow brought two students chosen to represent their class to Washington, DC, for a Lincoln Leadership Summit. Mother Seton Academy 8th grade students Trey Thomas and Mariah Armstead were chosen by Rossi in combination with recommendations from Ford's Theatre Teaching Artists to represent their class in the weekend filled with student master classes and teacher professional development. The weekend culminated in a showcase performance of Thomas' and Armstead's speeches on the stage of Ford's Theatre.

"It has been a rewarding experience for my students to learn how oratory contributed to the success of many movements in history," said Oratory Fellow Jim Rossi. "The students and I are thrilled to have the opportunity to travel to Washington, DC, to explore the city's rich history and perform on stage."
