It all began 19 years ago when Mother Seton Academy became the vision of these six Sponsoring Communities. Wanting to offer a quality Catholic Education to children who came from families that would not otherwise be able to afford it and knowing that no ONE community could do it alone, they joined hands and resources to open what is still today a co-ed tuition free Catholic School. Since then, over 200 middle school children from inner city low income families have received the best of education and gone on to graduate from some of the most prominent public, private and parochial high schools and colleges. Mother Seton Academy has been so successful because these six religious communities believed that the only way out of poverty for urban young men and women was to come together and give the gift of education.

While Peabody students practice their teaching methods, eager MSA students acquire the basic skills to play the harp and read music. Three Peabody harp students gave a beautiful performance at Mother Seton Academy on January 26, demonstrating the range of sounds and techniques a harpist can create. Three MSA students have been selected and will begin lessons with their student teachers in the upcoming weeks. At the culmination of the series, these students will perform in a recital at Peabody.
